Treasurer's Annual Report

On behalf of the Board of Directors, I am pleased to present the John Pierce Centre Ltd Special Purpose Financial Statements for 2024. The year proved to be strong in terms of profit and net operating cash flows. We achieved a net profit of \$36,258, driven by revenues of \$397,251 and expenses totalling \$360,993. This positive result was largely due to effective expense management, which saw a year-on-year reduction of \$43,894.

The tables below summarise our net profit (loss) and net equity position over the past four years. In the post-COVID period, the Board and Management focused on right-sizing our services and expenses. As a result, expenses have decreased from \$437,321 in 2020 to \$360,993 in 2024, a reduction of \$76,238. We are particularly pleased that, despite these cost reductions, we have been able to maintain all of our services.



Looking ahead to the coming year, we are projecting a modest profit, considering ongoing inflationary pressures and stable levels of donations, fundraising, and grant income.

I would like to take this opportunity to express my heartfelt thanks to everyone who has contributed to JPC over the past four years. Our major donors have shown unwavering support, and we are especially grateful to the Catholic Archdiocese, as well as the Ephpheta and Gorman Foundations. Without their generosity, our existence would not be possible.

In closing, the Board and I would like to extend our sincere appreciation to Executive Manager Sophie Duncan and her team for their disciplined approach to spending while ensuring the continued delivery of our services. I also want to recognise my fellow board members and chair, Trevor Hughes, for their ongoing support. Thanks also to our auditor, Ryk Eksteen of Collins & Co, for their invaluable assistance in preparing and reviewing the JPC Financial Statements.

We look forward to seeing you all at the centre.

Groups, Spiritual Care & Pastoral Care

Community activities have continued to support individuals experiencing isolation. JPC serves as an inclusive space designed specifically for D/deaf and hard of hearing individuals, creating a sense of safety and empowerment. Through a variety of activities, JPC helps build community connections, improve well-being, and promote skill development. The centre provides a Deaf-friendly environment that accommodates the unique perspectives and communication preferences of its visitors, ensuring smooth interactions. JPC recognises the dedication of its pastoral care team and group coordinators, who organise a wide range of enriching activities and offer essential support to vulnerable community members. The year 2024 was a vibrant period marked by increased engagement and stronger community ties.

Seniors Strengthening, Balance and Fitness Classes

JPC continued offering a seniors' exercise program designed to support the strength, balance, and fitness of older community members. The classes took place weekly over several weeks. Regular exercise helps seniors improve their physical health by strengthening muscles and bones, boosting cardiovascular health, and enhancing flexibility and balance, which in turn reduces the risk of falls and fractures.

These classes also provide valuable opportunities for social interaction and connection, which are crucial for emotional well-being within the Deaf community. They help combat feelings of loneliness and isolation, which are often experienced by older Deaf individuals.

Religious Liturgy Video Library

JPC collaborated with Teachers as Co-Learners—Catholic Education and Language—to produce a series of Auslan videos covering regular Mass liturgy and common prayers and scripture. The primary goal of this project was to create a valuable resource that can be accessed by families, children, schools, the Deaf community, interpreters, and the wider public. These videos provide Auslan translations of the regular Mass liturgy, helping to enhance understanding and foster a deeper connection to catholic faith for those who rely on Auslan for communication. By making the Mass more accessible, this initiative strives to promote inclusivity and strengthen spiritual engagement within the community.





Information Sessions for Senior Deaf

After receiving a grant in 2023, JPC was able to offer a series of workshops to the community in the first half of 2024. Seniors Rights Victoria led informative sessions on key topics to support the independence and financial security of older Deaf individuals. Delivering these sessions in Auslan is essential for promoting a better understanding of important issues such as financial safety, relationships with grandchildren, and adult children living at home. The sessions were extremely successful with high engagement by the Deaf community.

Partnerships

- Deaf Connect who are leaders in service provision in the Deaf sector, attended the community centre throughout the year to provide information sessions about services available to the community and guidance to accessing eligible services.
- Expression Australia who are leaders in service provision in the Deaf sector, attended the community centre throughout the year to provide information sessions and support individual Deaf community members on a regular basis.
- JPC worked with Tobin Brothers Funerals to support community members in the planning and organising of funerals throughout 2024. We are grateful for the continued partnership with Tobin Brothers for all their support of our community.
- JPC worked in partnership with JoCare to provide in home volunteers to Deaf people experiencing isolation. JoCare has provided key training to JPC volunteers that are then able to go out and visit Deaf people to provide stimulating conversation in Auslan and connection to community, language and culture.
- Victoria Police partnered with JPC to deliver a 'Coffee with a Cop' session where the Deaf community could come along and chat to police in a relaxed environment about any topic they wished.

In 2024 the John Pierce Centre provided a range of activities, events and supports. Communication is provided to community members and stakeholders via our newsletters. Information is also distributed via our Facebook page and website.

Expanding our network and contacts is a key element of the work at JPC to ensure successful outcomes for Deaf community.

Regular annual events at JPC were once again well attended, including the AGM. The Thankyou party was held to give thanks to all of the volunteers that give up their time to support the vital work of the JPC. We could not operate without volunteers and we are truly thankful for their time and energy.

The annual Christmas Rally is the biggest event of the calendar for the community where people come together to give thanks for the year and the community that share a deep and special connection through language, history and culture.

25 Years of Signee Tots Special Event

The main event for 2024 was the Signee Tots playgroup 25 Year Celebration. It was a celebration of connection, community and the countless lives we've touched along the way.

Access to early programs in Auslan like our playgroup, help in establishing strong foundations of sign language and Deaf identity in our young Deaf children as well as supporting CODAs (Children Of Deaf Adults) and families that use Auslan. It has consistently been a place of welcome, a safe and comfortable place where families are able to meet with other families, connect, and share in their journey of parenthood.

Over the years we have been blessed with many volunteers and staff who give their time and commitment for the program; creating fun activities and events to bring joy and laughter to children. It was wonderful to host a day where families from over the past 25 years, could come together as a community.

A huge thank you to Deaf Connect for providing a grant to ensure this event was successful and fun for all of our families!

The first chaplain to the Deaf

Catholic Community

The origins of the John Pierce Centre (JPC) date back to 1935 when Father John Pierce was appointed as the first Chaplain to the Catholic Deaf Community in Victoria by Archbishop Mannix. In those times, all the major denominations conducted missions of various sorts to the needy people of Melbourne; included in these were the deaf and blind.

Prior to 1979, Deaf Catholics were regular visitors at various churches in Melbourne including Armadale and St Francis, Melbourne. From 1973 to 1979, a monthly Mass was held at Jolimont at the Victorian Deaf Society.

In 1979, Fr Peter Robinson, Dr Pierre Gorman and Mr. Bryan A'Hearn were the driving force behind the setting up of John Pierce Centre at Ripponlea. A board of directors was set up as a Company limited by guarantee on 29th December 1979. The Centre was officially opened and blessed on Ephpheta Sunday, August 1980.

In 1995, The Catholic Deaf Community moved to the parish of Prahran and relocated to a refurbished church, St Francis Xavier, which had a multipurpose chapel and offices.

JPC has over 40 years of experience of supporting Deaf people who frequently are isolated within their local communities and even within their own families. Our pastoral care supports the well-being of our community and our community centre, all Deaf people and their families; sharing strength, friendship and the spirit of the Deaf Catholic Community.
