Christmas – Again!

So, Christmas is coming around again. It's time for me to write something for JPC's Christmas newsletter. I'm running late and skipping lunch because Rachel (our JPC manager) is coming after me and asking me where is my piece for the Christmas newsletter. As I start writing, I wonder what to say this year. After all, we celebrate Christmas every year, and every year I try to write something different. But how many times can I say anything really new and different about Christmas?

So, where do I start? The first thing that comes to me is that Christmas is a funny time. There is all the advertising in the media. We see lots of happy faces. People getting lots of wonderful (and expensive) presents. At the same time, Christmas can be a sad and lonely time for some people. Maybe there's been a death or divorce in the family, or just a falling out. Mum or Dad or a brother or sister — or even worse, a child — won't be there this Christmas. Looking back on my last report, I realise that some of my work is the same and yet there is always something new coming up. In August, I was out on the road again, visiting Gippsland and some parts of Western Victoria. These trips were to visit isolated deaf people, catch up on their stories and offer any support we could.

It was not only rural visiting, but more and more there is a need for supporting people in their suburban communities as well. Either with local services, shopping or medical appointment support.

Life in the office at JPC is always busy, with our community groups here enjoying their activities. It often happens that our deaf members will bring any paperwork that needs explaining, or maybe making a phone call for them. This can fast-track some simple problems sometimes.

I was lucky enough to have a week's holiday in September, and then joined some other JPC staff in Sydney for the Deaf Conference for Pastoral Care. It was a fantastic opportunity for me to meet other people from all over Australia & New Zealand, who are working in the same area. We shared stories, discussed problems and solutions and set up good networks for the future. October too was a busy month. We were required to support some of our deaf members in their personal struggles. We are very lucky to have a strong "team" here and all staff pitch in when needed. My time interpreting meetings / appointments and providing access to services has increased, but again, it can make life a lot easier for many. It is very rewarding when people smile more and struggle less.

As the year comes to a close, I am preparing for the filming of Mass For You At Home (MFYAH). This will be filmed in January 2013, and I will be organising the interpreters/rosters etc. for those Masses. I will definitely be in Gippsland Nov& Dec, catching up with my 'regulars' and enjoying the countryside.

The office is busy getting things organised before Christmas, and of course the Ephpheta Appeal. I visited two Parishes over two weekends, Clayton and Greensborough. I am always amazed and grateful at how generous people are with this Appeal, even when they are struggling.

## **St Francis Xavier, by Gail Finn**

Who is St. Francis Xavier? This question prompts me to search more about him because you may remember our building, John Pierce Centre used to be St Francis Xavier Church (before it was decommissioned in 2007).

I recently spent a weekend in Adelaide to celebrate the South Australian Catholic Deaf Association's 50<sup>th</sup> Jubilee. My good friend, Sister Majella O'Sullivan took me to St Francis Xavier Cathedral in Adelaide and mentioned to me that there was a relic of St Francis Xavier's right arm in that church. It is 500 years old! Indeed, I did not believe her at first!

This year, the relic of St Francis Xavier's right arm was brought down to Australia from Rome for the first time. Unfortunately, it was already moved to the diocese of Port Pirie in South Australia. Also we missed it in Victoria last October. It will continue its journey to Western Australia, Queensland and New South Wales. St Francis Xavier was born in Navarre in Spain in 1506. In a short 46 years of life, he had a big impact on the world. He studied in the University of Paris and there he met an older student named Inigo (St. Ignatius Loyola). Both were the first companions who formed the Society of Jesus - the Jesuit order. After becoming a Jesuit priest and a missionary, he bravely travelled to India (mostly Goa), East Asia, Sri Lanka, the Phillipines, Malaysia and Japan even Indonesia to spread the Gospel.

St Francis Xavier baptized tens of thousands into the faith. He worked so hard by preaching, visiting prisons, caring for the sick and dying. That was how he has inspired so many people. Eventually, he decided to go to China while travelling to Schanghuan Island only 14 kms to the mainland (China), he took sick and died with fever there on 3rd December, 1552.

The purpose of his relic (arm) came to Australia relating to the Catholic Church's theme "Year of Grace" for 2012. This relic reminds us of Christ's relationship with us and involves a spirit of faith, hope and love. Therefore St Francis Xavier is a great example for us. Why do people venerate relics? We humans like to keep some physical connection to loved one who have died. We visit their graves or keep a lock of hair. Therefore relics are more visible to us. We honour relics so we can feel closeness to the person like St Francis Xavier's arm.

## **SA Catholic Deaf Association – an extract story from Sr Majella O'Sullivan SSJ**

*Gail attended the SA Catholic Deaf Association 50 years celebration with Maureen Brown & Patricia Andersson. I hope you will enjoy reading this story.*

The Catholic Deaf Association was founded in 1962 to give support to deaf and hearing impaired people and their families. The ministry began with deaf and hearing impaired families approaching the Archbishop of Adelaide asking that their and their children's needs be met, and to have access to the life of the Church, as would a hearing

Catholic Church community in any parish. Still in 2012 this continues to be the aim of the Association, providing access no matter what the function within the Church Life.

On March 25th 1962, Archbishop Beovich of the Adelaide Archdiocese appointed Fr. John Chambers as Chaplain to the Catholic Deaf Community. The Community would attend a monthly Eucharist wherever a church was available. During the 60s and 70s the Community celebrated the Eucharist at various locations. In the late 70s a Centre was found in Cambridge Terrace, Malvern. The property belonged to the Parkside parish and had been used as a mass Centre. However, in the late 70s it was no longer used by Parkside parish and it was made available to the Catholic Deaf Association. The Centre became the Community's meeting place. The Association provided religious education for deaf children and ongoing help to deaf youth and adults, and arranged social and religious functions for deaf people and their families.

From the 60s the Sisters of Mercy and the Dominican Sisters were involved in ministering to the community. In the mid 80s the Sisters of St Joseph became involved until this present day.

The year 1966 saw the beginning of the Motor Mission to the Deaf. Two Dominican Sisters visited seven or eight speech and hearing centres and schools for the deaf all over the metropolitan area each week in order to give religious education to approximately 70 deaf and hearing impaired children. Classes were also held on Saturday mornings in the city to prepare children for the sacraments. There was a youth group held on Friday nights with a variety of activities, and a Mass in sign language followed by a meeting for the adult deaf people every month. There was also a monthly meeting of the parents and friends which offered support and friendship, and which involved necessary fund-raising.

The Association, through interpreting and visits, assists those deaf parents who have hearing children in Catholic Schools. This allows the parents to have access to the life of the school community. Part-time chaplains in the early days included Frs John Chambers, Dennis Edwards, Michael Trainor and Brendan Harnett. The present chaplains being Frs Kevin Taylor and Mario van Antwerpen celebrate the sacraments through the access of an Interpreter.

The Community now attends Eucharist and social gatherings at St John the Baptist Church and Hall at Plympton, every month on the first Sunday. The community, both deaf and hearing fluctuates between 30 to 40 people and is open to all faiths and ages.

At present the Association is without a permanent base from which to operate. We are grateful to the Plympton Parish for their welcome and generous offer to use their facilities for our monthly Eucharist and gathering. Yet there is still a need to have an office area from which we can co-ordinate the activities of the Association and for the members of the Community to come and see the Pastoral Associate or one of the Chaplains.

The future of the Association is one that is based in our deeply held conviction of the dignity of every human being. Our mission is to continue to provide opportunities for the Gospel message to be proclaimed in Sign Language and to assist families with Deaf or Hearing Impaired children to have access to the Sacraments and the Life of the Catholic Church.

We give thanks to God for all the Blessings of the past 50 years and for the people who have been part of our Association both past and present. We gather to celebrate our life as a Faith Community and we seek God's continued Blessings for the future.

## **Fr Cyril Axelrod CSSR, by Katrina Mynard**

I feel privileged having met Fr Cyril Axelrod, when Fr Cyril was here visiting JPC not long ago. He came down to Melbourne after spending three weeks in Sydney. Ephpheta Centre in Sydney organised for Fr Cyril to come to Australia and JPC looked after him for a week when he was here.

I have heard a lot of him through people and many of them advised me to meet Fr Cyril Axelrod. Now I have finally met Fr Cyril in person and I found him to be a amazing person.

*For those who don't know Fr Cyril, he was born deaf in South Africa, to Jewish parents. He wasn't diagnosed with deafness till he was three years old. And for Usher Syndrome, at late thirties. Fr Cyril then became a Catholic when he was a young man after his dreams of becoming a rabbi were shattered. Fr Cyril worked tirelessly in South Africa, Macau, Hong Kong and many other countries.*

Many events were organised for the week when Fr Cyril was in Melbourne, including meeting Deaf Blind Community, giving a talk to the community, visit to St Mary's School, Retreat and leading the special Ephpheta Mass. Fr Cyril has captivated the congregation. Many people came to Mass and they were all in awe. They watched the whole Mass. It was amazing to see Fr Cyril do the Mass by himself.

## **Secrets of How to Be Happy for Busy Families, by Rebecca Miller**

### **Secret #1 Enjoy Each Other**

Uplift each other and treat each other with care, interest and love. Parents come home and the kids are happy to see them. When the kids come home parents are happy to see them. How do they know you are happy? Smile, hug, kiss and welcome each other; maybe one of these or all of them!

### **Secret #2 Swap Stories**

When kids come home, ask them what happened in school and have a story for them. When you come home put your kids first, take the time to ask about their day and be ready to talk about something interesting from your day. If you walk in dejected/distracted and five minutes later watch T.V or are busy in the kitchen your kids will not look forward to seeing you each day and will start to choose friends over family. Take some time to catch up and share your day.

### **Secret #3 Break Bread Together**

Families that eat together, stay together. Family dinners are a time to connect and communicate. Try and aim for at least four family dinners each week.

### **Secret # 4 Have Fun Together**

In happy families, family comes before friends. Rules and boundaries are important but remember that kids need fun too. When kids get bored at home they will start looking for excitement out of the home and that is when they can get into trouble. Friendship is important but it should not be more important than family.

### **Secret #5 Don't Work Too Much**

All work and no play does worse things to a family than make it boring. If you are away all the time and do not have time for your kids they will begin to feel insecure and that they are not valuable enough for you to choose them over other commitments. If you really feel you have no choice about work, talk to your kids about this, be sensitive to how they might feel and be willing to plan "special family time" as often as possible.

### **Secret #6 Never Fight in Front of the Kids**

While some fighting and bickering can be part of family life, try and keep it away from the children. If they do see you fight and argue, apologize and say "we are sorry you had to see that, Daddy and I had a disagreement but everything is OK now". Tension in the home can cause children to worry long after you have calmed down and forgotten the argument. If you feel you argue too much get some help from a counsellor.

### **Recipe – Mars Bar Christmas Crackles by Melissa Hughes for Kidspot**

#### Ingredients:

200g Mars Bars, chopped	2 tbsp of pouring (thin) cream
2 tsp cocoa powder, sifted	3 cups Rice Bubbles
Canola spray	100g white chocolate
24 red Smarties or M&M's	

#### Method:

Spray a little canola spray into 2 x 12 cup mini muffin trays

Melt the Mars Bars, cream and cocoa in a glass bowl over simmering water.

The bowl should not touch water. Stir the mixture until smooth.

Put the rice bubbles in a separate large bowl, pour in the chocolate mixture and stir until well mixed.

Spoon the mixture into the muffin tray and press down gently. Refrigerate for 2 hrs.

Melt white chocolate in microwave and stir at 30 seconds intervals.

Turn the crackles upside down and put white chocolate on top. Finish with a red smartie on top of each one.

#### **Activity for Children, *Ribbon Christmas Tree Decoration Xmas Tree***

#### **Materials**

8—15 beads (large)

30-40cm of ribbon (at least 1.5cm wide)

Needle & Thread

#### **Instructions**

- Cut a length of cotton and thread on a bead. Use a large bead for the base. Secure the bead, then thread the cotton through the bead a few times and complete with a knot.

- Start with about 6cm of ribbon and fold over. Push the needle up through the centre.
- Add a bead
- Fold the ribbon back, making it sit just a little in from the last layer. Thread the needle in the centre.
- Repeat steps 3 to 5 until you have a Christmas Tree shape. Finish off with a bead at the top and secure it with a knot.

## **Obituary by Karina Hart**

Eveline ('Eve') Catherine Hart, 20<sup>th</sup> April, 1935 – 12<sup>th</sup> August 2012

Eveline Catherine was the oldest of six children born to Isabel and Alfred Cornwall in Bairnsdale. She spent her early years living with her family in Bruthen, a small country town nearby. Shortly after her eighth birthday, Eve was in hospital to have her tonsils removed. She became ill, which resulted in her losing her hearing. Soon after, she went to Melbourne to attend what was then called 'the Deaf and Dumb School'. She was to live in Melbourne with her Aunty Poppy, returning home to Bruthen in the school holidays. Eve was the second dux of Deaf school in her final year, and wanted to go on to University, but at the time, this was not allowed. She became the first deaf person to do a business course at Scott's Business College. She loved dancing in her early years, and won the 'Belle of the Ball' three times.

She met Fred Hart at a dance at the Hawthorn Town Hall, and went on to marry him. They initially rented a house in Hawthorn, and then had their home built in Blackburn North, built by their brother-in-law. They had five children, Karina, Sharene, Vicki, Brett and Rodney. Fred was a fireman who sometimes worked three jobs to provide for his family, so it was helpful that Aunt Poppy moved in to provide support. Eve joined the workforce in the late 1960's and worked her way up from typist to the supervisor of a word processing pool.

After Fred passed away in 1994, she became an active member of the Deaf Club, she enjoyed playing Bingo there. Other favourite pastimes were playing Scrabble & doing crosswords, watching TV shows such as 'Australian Idol' and supporting her favourite footy team, the mighty Hawks. She loved gardening and her dogs, always Cavalier King Charles spaniels. She loved spending time at the family beach house, at Rhyll, Phillip Island. She also embraced the new technology of the computer and the internet, and emails replaced letters to her family and friends. She also loved being a Grandma, and had seven grandchildren. Her friend and companion, Greg Culpitt, boarded with her in later years. She was never hardened by adversity and always had a ready smile for all.
